Chapter 1: He That Hath No Sword

1. There are many possible answers here, but among the reasons that are cited in the text are a) More Americans died in the Civil War than all other American Wars combined; b) Tennessee had more Civil War battles than any other state except Virginia; c) Tennessee was split during the war, with a majority of people in East Tennessee siding with the Union and a majority of people in West and Middle Tennessee siding with the Confederacy.
2. The *Christian Advocate* article is written from the Confederate point of view and assumes that all of its readers are also Confederates and that they are eager to fight. The article also makes the assumption that southerners will fight harder than northerners.
3. The main reason East Tennessee sided with the Union is that there were far less slaves there than in other parts of the state, and many East Tennesseans didn't want to fight a war to defend slavery.

Chapter 2: 1862

1. The fall of Fort Donelson left no forts between the U.S. Army and Nashville, which is why Nashville fell to the Union Army a week later.
2. The Union Army was heading toward a railroad intersection in Corinth, Mississippi, shown on a map on the online teacher's guide.
3. Both soldiers described how the "enemy" opened fire, killing many other men around them
4. Answers will vary. The reason I asked this question is that most Americans today regard William Driver as a hero, in spite of what his

fellow Nashvillians attitude toward him during his lifetime.

Chapter 3: Occupation

1. The Union Army often prevailed because it usually had more soldiers in reserve and more equipment and weapons it could bring to the field of battle, and also because it had a Navy.
2. The oath required them to say that they were an "active friend" of the U.S. government and that they would rejoice in the defeat of the Confederate Army--something that no one who sided or sympathized with the Confederacy or had a friend or family member in the Confederate Army could possibly agree to.
3. For one thing, the Emancipation Proclamation meant that former slaves could enlist in the Union Army. For another, the Emancipation Proclamation meant that, starting in January 1863, slavery was abolished in land newly captured by the U.S. Army.

Chapter 4: Tod Carter Comes Home

1. Answers will vary. General Hood moved his Confederate Army from Georgia back to Tennessee with the intention of attacking Nashville and taking Nashville, which (he hoped) would force the entire Union Army to follow him back north and west to Nashville. However, it's worth pointing out that during the last 150 years, MANY West Point cadets have been taught that General Hood's strategy was ill-advised.
2. Tod Carter fought in and survived battles all over the South, then died in a battle which took place in his family's front yard.

Chapter 5: Tailor and Parson

1. Most Tennesseans either fought for the Confederacy or were Confederate sympathizers. Therefore they disliked Governor Brownlow, who was a Unionist.
2. The Ku Klux Klan

3. Several laws were changed in the late 1880s that made it nearly impossible for African Americans to be elected to public office. For more about these laws, see the online teacher's guide.

4. Answers will vary. This may seem like a strange question, but at its core, the KKK was a SECRET organization. Members, who wore masks, were sworn to secrecy about what it did and who else was in it.

2. The original Tennessee Constitution of 1790 banned interracial marriage and interracial schools.

Chapter 8: Leaving the Farm

1. The Homestead Act
2. Answers will vary. Children were affected, especially if their parents moved away from farm to factory jobs. Some of these children went to work for the factories, but others who

did not were affected because they moved from a rural setting to an urban one.

Chapter 9: Coal Creek War

1. Free coal miners kept sending inmate miners away because they wanted their jobs back.
2. According to the New York newspaper, the convict lease system was worse than slavery because, under slavery, the mining company and the slaveholder wanted to keep the slave alive. However, under the convict lease system, the state had little or no interest in keeping the convicts alive.

Chapter 10: Old Hickory Division

1. It took more than a year because soldiers had to be registered, organized, trained and shipped across the ocean. (This isn't stated in the text, but it's a good topic for the students to figure out on their own. Also, this is a good opportunity for students to be reminded that in 1918, troops were moved by ship—not by airplane.)
2. The Old Hickory Division
3. His father donated land for Knoxville's airport under the condition that it be named for Charles McGee Tyson.
4. Maybe because the story in *Saturday Evening Post* pointed out that, at first, he tried to avoid the war for religious reason. Also, the movie made about him in 1941 (called "Sergeant York" was the highest grossing movie of the year that the U.S. was drawn into World War II.)

Chapter 11: Suffrage and Segregation

1. The Tennessee General Assembly's vote on the suffrage amendment was especially important because, prior to that time, 35 of the 48 states had passed the 19th Amendment. Since the Constitution requires 3/4 of the states to pass a new amendment, and since 36 is 3/4 of 48,

Tennessee had the opportunity to be the state that put the suffrage amendment "over the top."

2. According to Wells, the white ladies and gentlemen encouraged the conductor and even applauded him when he was dragging her out of the coach.

3. This is something students don't know yet, obviously, but most cemeteries are still classified by race, as are most funeral homes!

Chapter 12: Tennessee's New Deal

1. If you had money in a bank that "closed" during the Great Depression, it meant you lost part or all of the money that you had deposited in that bank.

2. After TVA was created, the cost of electricity dramatically decreased. (See illustration on the online teacher's guide.)

3. Answers will vary, depending on what part of Tennessee your students live in.

4. Answers will vary. I, Bill Carey, grew up in North Alabama, attended great public schools, and spent a lot of time on Guntersville Lake. But when I was growing up, I NEVER learned the story behind TVA!

Chapter 14: Home Front

1. The Highlander Folk School is where many of the people who were Civil Rights leaders in the 1950s and 1960s came up with strategies for how to change the way white and Black people interacted in the South.

2. The first public high school in Tennessee to desegregate was Oak Ridge High School in August 1955, followed by Clinton High School in August 1956.

3. Bobby Cain had a miserable senior year because a) He had been to Austin High School his first 3 years of high school and didn't want to leave his friends and transfer to Clinton High; b) He was not allowed to play on the Clinton High football team; c) Some students at Clinton High school were trying to start fights with him; d) Protestors from all over the U.S. descended on Clinton to protest the desegregation of the

public high school, and as one of the two seniors, he was in the center of the storm.

4. When African-American sharecroppers in Fayette County tried to register to vote in 1959, many were evicted from their homes.

Chapter 17: Promised Land
